MINDY COLLINS CLASS OF 1996, starred in three sports for the Mustangs. In Softball, Basketball, and Volleyball, she earned All-State honors 6 times. During her senior year Mindy help lead the Mustangs to 1st ever Conference Championship in volleyball and 2nd ever Basketball championship. In softball she led the team with 26 –2 pitching record, which included 7 no hitters. Earning a scholarship at Miami of Ohio, Mindy continued to excel in volleyball by earning 4 varsity letters and helping Miami to 3 MAC championships.



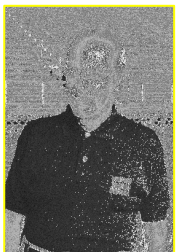
ANN DETTLOFF CLASS OF 1998, has the distinction of being Portage Central's only two- sport All-American. Anne led the Mustang's to 2 swimming conference championships and an All-American performance her senior year. In water polo, Anne is credited with being the driving force in starting girls water polo in Portage. During her senior year she led Portage to a 3rd place finish at state championships and earned Michigan player of the year and All-American honors. At the University of Massachusetts, Anne continued her sport double by helping U Mass to an Atlantic 10 championship in swimming and an 5th place finish at the NCAA water polo championships.



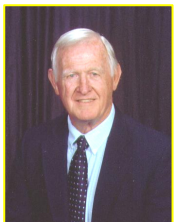
ROB GRAINGER CLASS OF 1981, is regarded as one of Portage Central's best all around three sport athletes, excelling in football, basketball and track. As a junior in track, Rob won the Class A 440, earning All-American honors. During his senior year, Rob was All-State in football earning Team MVP honors. In basketball, Rob was the Mustangs leading scorer & rebounder, setting the school record in scoring with 721 points. In track, Rob earned All-State honors, set 4 school records and in the G-K meet, Rob won 5 events. Rob accepted a track scholarship at U of M, and continued his track success by helping Michigan to three Big 10 track championships.



DR. WILLIAM R. KAVANAUGH TEAM DOCTOR 1948-96, truly loved being the team physician for Portage Central High School. Nobody bled the blue and gold more than Doc. He served as team physician for PCHS from 1948, the first year Portage High fielded a football team, until his death in 1996. While Doc supported all athletic activities at PC, he was most associated with the football program. Many will always remember the tossing of his red hat after a Mustang touchdown. In 1966, the passing of the Kavanaugh Football Trophy became part of an ongoing tradition to the winner of the annual Portage Central/Portage Northern football game.



BOB KNIGHT COACH 1971-2004 is regarded as a coach's coach, having guided Portage Central's Football program for 34 years. Using hard work, coupled with motivation and class, he turned a losing program into a "model" program. During his coaching tenure, the Mustang's won 14 Conference Championships, made 11 playoff appearances (including the state championship game in 1977), and once won 39 consecutive conference games.



MIKE McCLOUGHAN COACH 1968-1999, Portage Central's long time wrestling and Freshman football coach. Though he never wrestled in high school or college, Coach McCloughan built the Mustang's wrestling program into one of the premier teams in the state. Known for his hard work ethic and the ability to develop great wrestlers from scratch. During his tenure McCloughan coached two state champions, and 17 All- Staters. His record of 58 consecutive conference dual wins stands as a Big 8 record in wrestling.
